The table provided (1) presents the data on international visits to Britain from 1975 and 1998.

In general, there was a (2) surge in the number of trips made over the surveyed period, during which most visited for a leisurely purpose. Despite having visitors from all over the world, they were (3) predominantly residents from Western Europe.

In 1975, there were 9.5 million excursions to the United Kingdom, and this figure (4) nearly doubled over the decade before eventually levelling off (5) at around 25 million visits in the late 1990s. While visits for business purposes (6) witnessed the most noticeable (7) rise in proportion by approximately four times the original 1.8 million, holiday visits constituted the lion's share, (8) starting at 7.7 million trips in 1975 and (9) settling at around 19 million in the end.

(10) In terms of the visitors' places of origin, those hailing from Western Europe were prevalent and (11) remained far ahead of the other two groups consistently. On the whole, 5.9 million visits were made by residents from this region and the number nearly (12) tripled to 16.6 million trips by 1998. Meanwhile, trips made by the North Americans and those from the rest of the world also saw a sharp growth, with (13) both starting at 1.9 and 1.7 million visits in 1975 (14) respectively before (15) reaching 4.6 million each in 1998.
